SNHU provides opportunities early in your program to engage in professional activities. Opportunities include:

In a Career Development Center survey, 94 percent of SNHU graduates with a degree in psychology were employed within six months of graduation. In addition, 30 percent of graduates with degrees in psychology moved directly from SNHU to master's and doctoral programs.

Psychology

Develop an understanding of human behavior and mental processes with a Psychology degree from Southern New Hampshire University. Gain a solid foundation in the content, methods and processes of psychology and apply what you have learned during field experiences.

Classroom experiences are integrated with applied learning opportunities such as case studies, group projects, experiential learning, internships and research activities. During classroom and field experiences you will learn to think critically, apply scientific knowledge, define your specific area of interest, and use your psychological knowledge in actual settings.

As an undergraduate studying psychology at SNHU, you will have the rare opportunity to choose one of three concentration areas, taking four concentration courses as your psychology electives. With a concentration in child and adolescent development you will learn how individuals gain skills and knowledge, progress socially, and grow physically. A concentration in forensic psychology focuses on how psychology intersects with the legal system: motives and patterns of criminal behavior, insanity definitions, corrections assessments and treatments, and criminal profiling. If you choose a concentration in mental health, you can be in the field your freshman year, gaining experience that enhances classroom learning as you explore how professionals diagnose and treat mental disorders.
