Now That You're Here

Our welcome program will help you complete the university registration process, familiarize yourself with SNHU, and meet students and staff. Completing these activities will help you adjust to life on campus.



Check-In

Upon arrival, come to the International Student Welcome Desk for Check–In. Our Welcome Crew will give you a checklist of tasks you need to complete before classes begin, provide you with important information, and even help you find housing. Please bring with you your passport, I-20 or DS-2019, required medical documents (with English translations), and payment for first term tuition and fees.

International Student Welcome and Orientation

Our welcome program includes a variety of activities that help you settle in and connect with new and current students. Within this, our International Student Orientation will provide you with essential information on health insurance, academic and personal support services, maintaining immigration status, and ways to become involved here at SNHU. Because this information is vital to your success, attendance at Orientation is mandatory.

IT Access

You can access your my.SNHU account with your SNHU username (firstname.lastname@snhu.edu) and password (your birthdate in MMDDYYYY format). Your username is also your SNHU email address. Remember to check your SNHU email several times each week.

Living In the US

Adjusting to life in the US may take some time, so try to be patient and keep an open mind. Once you start finding your way around and making new friends, things will get easier. For a successful transition we suggest that you:



Embracing American Culture

Succeeding at SNHU

Library and Learning Commons

Our Library and Learning Commons provides the perfect space for you to study on your own or meet fellow students to work on group projects. Library staff are also available to help you navigate our hardcopy and online resources.

Wolak Learning Center

Located in the Wolak Library and Learning Commons, the Wolak Learning Center team offers course-specific and skill-specific tutoring for both undergraduate and graduate students on the Manchester campus. International students are encouraged to utilize the Center's Conversational English program, where you can practice your English speaking skills in a friendly and comfortable setting.

Academic Advisors

You are required to meet with your Academic Advisor regularly to speak about your academic, professional, and personal goals. Your Advisor will provide you with guidance to successfully complete your academic program requirements and is also available to ensure you know about the available support services and explain university policies.

IT Help Desk

At SNHU, you will have access to the university's IT network. Before you are able to connect, you must have an up-to-date anti-virus program installed on your computer. If you need help, or have any IT problems, visit the Help Desk in the Wolak Library Learning Commons. You can also call 855-877-9919.

- Speak with the Wolak Learning Center staff. They can help you develop academic writing and study skills.

Health Insurance

All SNHU international students are required to purchase the health insurance policy provided by the school, unless you have an equivalent US policy through your government scholarship or parent/spouse working in the US or Canada. All students are automatically enrolled in the SNHU International Student Insurance Plan and will be billed to your SNHU account on a regular basis. Further details about the policy and how to use it will be provided to you at Orientation. Please make sure to carry your proof of insurance with you at all times.

Staying Safe

In comparison to other similarly sized cities, Manchester has a fairly low crime rate. That being said, there are steps you can take and resources available to help make sure you have a positive and safe experience.

SNHU Public Safety staff are available on campus 24 hours a day, every day. Along with ensuring campus safety through regular patrols, the Public Safety team provides a walking escort service, can assist if your car battery dies while on campus, and serves as the university's lost and found. If you need a parking permit, complete the online application at: snhu.thepermitstore.com. If you need help, contact Public Safety at 603–645–9700.

Tips for staying safe:

- · Keep your door locked.
- · Don't leave personal items unattended.
- Don't walk alone at night.

 (If on campus, call Public Safety to escort you to your car or on-campus housing)
- · Use crosswalks.
- Use the blue emergency boxes on campus if you do not feel safe and need assistance.
- When going out, have a plan for getting home. Take money and the phone number for a taxi just in case.

Housing

On-Campus Housing

On-campus living is available for students at all levels of study, and it's a great option for meeting American students. Please contact Residence Life at housingquestions@snhu.edu to check availability. There is no family housing on campus, so married students and students with children will need to research housing options in the local community.

Temporary Housing

If you are unsure about where you would like to live once you arrive, there are temporary housing options within the Residence Halls on campus. Please contact housingquestions@snhu.edu if you have questions about temporary housing.

Homestays

For students wishing to live with a local family, SNHU has partnered with American Homestay Network to provide homestay opportunities. Homestays are a great option if you wish to learn more about American culture, desire to be more connected to the local community, and feel more "at home" during your studies at Southern New Hampshire University. Off-Campus Apartments

Off-campus housing options are available throughout Manchester. There are many apartment buildings close to campus as well as further away, with a varied range of costs to fit every budget. Driving in New Hampshire

If you have a driver's license from your home country AND an international driving permit, you can legally drive in the US for the first 60 days after your arrival. After 60 days, you will need a US driver's license.

Getting a License

To drive in the US, you must apply for a driver's license in the state where you live. In New Hampshire you need to apply for the license at the Concord Division of Motor Vehicles. The application process includes passing a vision, written, and driving test. Further details are available on the Division of Motor Vehicles website.

Buying a Car

There are many considerations when buying a car in the US. Am I getting a good car at a fair price? How do I register and insure my car? Before buying a car, read the car topics section in the International Student Services my.SNHU page. Buying car insurance is **strongly** recommended.

Parking at SNHU

A parking permit is required to park at SNHU. To buy a permit, complete the online form at: snhu.thepermitstore.com.

Winter Driving

Winter driving is challenging. Though it is best to remain at home, if you must drive, read through the American Automobile Association's Winter Driving Tips online. Also ensure that your phone is charged and you have an emergency pack in your car (ice scraper, jumper cables, shovel, flashlight, safety flares, and snacks).



RENTAL INSURANCE

It is important to have rental insurance in case of theft or fire. See the Insurance section on the International Student Services my.SNHU page for more details.



SNHU ALERTS

Severe weather conditions can sometimes cause the university to cancel or delay office hours or classes. To have notifications sent to your cell phone and email, register for SNHU Alerts at snhuweb.snhu.edu/snhu-alerts/

Money Matters

Student Financial Services

Student Financial Services assists with questions and concerns around billing, wire transfers/payments, refunds, student ID cards, transcripts, and diplomas. As the payment of tuition and fees is due upon arrival, wiring money to SNHU before you leave home is recommended. When wiring money to SNHU, please only send funds to cover your University fees. Any money needed to cover your living expenses should be sent directly to your bank account once you open one.

Banking

It is a good idea to have a US bank account during your studies. We have Citizens Bank and Bank of America ATMs on campus. When deciding on a bank, consider its location, hours, and fees. To open an account, bring your passport, I-94, I-20 or DS-2019, SNHU ID, and money for your first deposit. Please do not carry large amounts of cash.

Budgeting

When adjusting to American currency, it is a good idea to keep track of your spending. Listing your essentials (rent, food, utilities) and non-essentials (concerts, going out) will help you understand where you can reduce your spending.

Employment

US immigration regulations limit international students to on-campus work for the first year. Unfortunately, there are only a small number of jobs available each term, so you will need to carefully plan your finances.

- Listings of job openings are available online at **snhu.edu**. For openings in the Dining Center and Bookstore, speak with staff in these areas.
- After your first year, you may be eligible to apply for off-campus work permission through SNHU's ISS office. Consult the OPT and Internships sections on the International Student Services' my.SNHU pages.
- Students should also refer to the State Department website (state.gov) for information on the Wilberforce Act, which outlines the rights and protections for temporary workers.

Scholarships

Undergraduate and graduate students currently enrolled and expecting to be enrolled at SNHU in the coming fall term may be eligible to apply for various Named and Endowed Scholarships between January – March 15. Click the Scholarships link on the Student Financial Services page on my.SNHU for a listing of available scholarships and applications.

Financial Hardship

Sometimes circumstances outside of your control (such as a loss of financial sponsor, natural disasters, or military conflicts) may affect your financial support and ability to pay your university tuition and fees. If you have any financial problems, please speak with an advisor in International Student Services as soon as possible.



TOP TIPS

Some US shops and theaters offer a student discount, so keep your SNHU student ID with you just in case.

Remember to keep your financial documents secure and your passwords private.


