Tools for Collaboration

Online education is often viewed as a barrier to collaboration. After all, geographic distance makes it hard for students to work together, and if you don't have the right technology in place, your options for collaboration will also be limited. It's easy to avoid collaboration by structuring a course around individual projects and asynchronous communication, but this overlooks a fundamental part of the learning process. For learning to be meaningful, it needs to include a variety of ways for you to collaborate with students and for them to collaborate with each other. Explore these resources to find methods of incorporating meaningful collaboration in your online lessons.
